1. Summary of Progress of the ACE Sector Capability Building Contract

Introduction

Adult and Community Education (ACE) Aotearoa Incorporated (ACE Aotearoa) is the lead body for the sector. It is a professional development body of networks of adult and community educators. ACE Aotearoa supports the sector to deliver centrally co-ordinated, structured learning. This in turn helps to strengthen and support effective ACE delivery and improve ACE learner outcomes, particularly for priority learner groups identified in the Tertiary Education Strategy.

The purpose of the ACE Sector Capability Building Contract is to enable ACE Aotearoa to perform three roles and achieve the following outcomes:

| Role | Outcomes |
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| Strategic sector leadership | The contribution and impact of ACE provision to the broader tertiary education sector is better recognised and understood. The impact of ACE provision is appropriately measured, communicated and leveraged across the tertiary education sector. |
| Sector capability building | Sector capability and capacity is strengthened and developed through the creation of collaborative and strategic opportunities to build and share resources that benefit the ACE sector. |
| Sector co-ordination | The ACE sector is supported in meaningful ways to deliver learner success, maximising efficiency and effectiveness of the sector. |

| | ACE Conference Kei te Pohewa Anotia (Re-imagining ACE) | 13 – 14 June 2021 | | <p>120 people attended the ACE Conference, more than 90% of participants reported the conference was highly valuable for their work and the most diverse demographic, particularly an increase of Māori and Pacific ACE workforce. | | Hui Fono Workshops Wā o Le Vā – Conceptionalising Life-long Learning | | | <p>Two workshops were held in Kaitia (hosted by Far North REAP, 29 April) and Hastings (hosted by EIT, 25 June) with 66 participants including a number of local Ministry of Education staff. The workshop designs were tailored to introduce Pacific pedagogical application using ancestrally qualified concepts of Ura (Cook Islands performance, targeting cultural and health and wellbeing outcomes), and Kakala (Tongan research method) within a learning and teaching environment. More than 90% reported they were satisfied with the programme and specific mention that the nature of the workshops appealed to a broader network engagement with tertiary providers and local Māori and Pacific communities who would not otherwise attend.</p> <p>Promotion for the six remaining workshops are underway. The total amount available per funding found is \$100,000. Five applications were approved, total allocation \$54,626 with reach to 17 organisations (note the grant criteria requires collaborative submissions). Majority of grants were targeted at upskilling teaching staff in literacy and te reo practices.</p> |
